## ***Can you guess my age?***

It is a popular notion that dogs age 7 years for each calendar year. However, studies have proven that canine aging is much more rapid in the first two years of a dog's life and that after he is two, the ratio is lowered down to 5 to 1 for small and medium breeds, 6 to 1 for large breeds and 7 to 1 for giant breeds.

That means that a 10 year old Great Dane would be 80 human years old when a pug or cavalier would only be 64!

One of the best ways to prolong life and functions of an elderly dog is to regulate his fuel intake. Older dogs exercise less and need fewer calories. Age reduces their abilities to absorb nutrients, so you may consider a high quality food specifically designed for their needs. Excessive amounts of protein, phosphorus and sodium can aggravate heart and kid-

## Natural Remedies—Apple Cider Vinegar



**...“Taken internally, ACV is credited with maintaining the acid/alkaline balance of the digestive tract”.**

Every home with dogs should have natural raw apple cider vinegar. It's a remedy with multiple uses for dogs: alleviating allergies, arthritis, establishing correct pH balance. You can also give apple cider vinegar to cats.

If your dog has itchy skin, the beginnings of a hot spot, incessantly washes its feet, has smelly ears, or is picky about his food, the application of ACV may change things around. For poor appetite, use it in the food – 1 teaspoon, two times a day for a 15 pound dog. For itchy skin or beginnings hot spots, put ACV into a spray bottle, part the hair and spray on. Any skin eruption will dry up in 24 hours and will save you having to shave the dog. If the skin is already broken, dilute ACV with an equal amount of water and spray on.

Taken internally, ACV is credited with maintaining the acid/alkaline balance of the digestive tract. To check your dog's pH balance, pick up some pH strips at the drug store and first thing in the morning test the dog's urine. If it reads anywhere from 6.2 – 6.5, your dog's system is exactly where it should be. If it is 7.5 or higher, the diet you are feeding is too alkaline, and ACV will re-establish the correct balance.

If you have a dog that has clear, watery discharge from the eyes, a runny nose, or coughs with a liquid sound, use ACV in his or her food. One teaspoon twice a day

should do the job.

After your weekly grooming sessions, use a few drops in his or her ears after cleaning them to avoid ear infections. Other uses for ACV are the prevention of muscle weakness, cramps, feeling the cold, calluses on elbows and hock joints, constipation, bruising too easily, pimples on skin surfaces, twitching of facial muscles, sore joints, arthritis and pus in the urine. There are also reports that it is useful in the prevention of bladder and kidney stones.

Fleas, flies, ticks and bacteria, external parasites, ring worm, fungus, staphylococcus, streptococcus, pneumococcus, mange, etc., are unlikely to inhabit a dog whose system is acidic inside and out. Should you ever experience any of these with your dog, bathe with a nice gentle herbal shampoo, rinse thoroughly, and then sponge on ACV diluted with equal amounts of warm water. Allow your dog to drip dry. It is not necessary to use harsh chemicals for minor flea infestations. All fleas drown in soapy water and the ACV rinse makes the skin too acidic for a re-infestation. If you are worried about picking up fleas when you take your dog away from home, keep some ACV in a spray bottle, and spray your dog before you leave home, and when you get back. Take some with you and keep it in the car, just in case you need it any time. Obviously

for major infestations, more drastic measures are necessary. ACV normalizes the pH levels of the skin, makes you dog unpalatable to even the nastiest of bacteria and you have a dog that smells like a salad, a small price to pay.

Not only do I give my dogs ACV, I take 2 tablespoons per day. I put it in my ice tea instead of lemon. It is just as refreshing. It is important to purchase a raw, natural, non-pasteurized ACV such as Bragg's. ACV has a live culture and pasteurization kills the culture, making it tasty but useless for our purposes.

As always, check with your veterinarian prior to starting any natural remedy.

## My Time at Crufts



**..“Discover Dogs, a part of Crufts, is a huge (200+) Meet the Breeds experience”....**

I was very lucky to have the opportunity to attend Crufts, in Birmingham, England this year, and what an awesome experience it was! It is reputed to be the largest dog show in the world, with some 28,000 dogs competing. The National Exhibition Center (NEC), where the show is held, is definitely the largest venue I have ever seen. The place is huge, all one building, but with lots of different Halls. Each hall was about the size of a small building and had several rings set up in it. It was also my first experience with a benched dog show. As a spectator, I thought it was great. If I were exhibiting, I would probably be too much of a nervous wreck to want to talk to strangers before going into the ring.

Crufts lasts for four days, with two different groups scheduled each day, so the 28,000 dogs do not descend on the NEC all at once. The Group judging is held around 8:00 each evening.

While conformation was going on in the Halls, there were many performance events and demonstrations going on in the Arena. There were all kinds of competitions, including national and international championships in agility, flyball, heelwork to

music, and, my own personal favorite, Freestyle. There were also many different types of demonstrations, such as how dogs assist in war and in police work, and obedience. And, did I mention, Crufts is also a shopper's haven, with more than 400 vendors.

Discover Dogs, a part of Crufts, is a huge (200+ breeds) Meet The Breed. Since I was experiencing Cavalier withdrawal, of course I went to their booth, and of course the dogs were wonderful, sweet, friendly, and beautiful. A little girl in a wheelchair came up, and wanted to pet one, so one was placed in her lap, and was just loving her. Cavaliers are definitely a natural for therapy work, but that's another story.

The Cavaliers were shown on Saturday. I don't think I've ever seen this many Cavaliers together at one time. Heaven.

The dogs were shown in one ring, and the bitches in the ring next to it. I guess they were separate because of the number of entries. A beautiful tri bitch, Loranka's Sherrie Baby JW was Best of Breed. Unfortunately, she did not go on to win the Toy group.

## Our April Speaker

Elizabeth Barrett

We were very privileged to have as our April meeting speaker, Elizabeth Barrett from Caring Canine / Loving Touch Rehabilitation Centers.

Elizabeth gave a presentation on the various types of rehab that a canine can go through after a muscle pull, operation, stroke, hip dysplasia, nerve ruptures, etc.

Discussed were several forms of therapeutic exercises used for rehabilitation, such as:

- Ball exercises for hip dysplasia and patella surgeries
- Resistance bands
- Wobble boards to strengthen the hind end of an animal
- Cavalettes for weight shifting and working luxating patellas

- Underwater treadmill
- Hoists for large dogs with no motion in the back

Also used in therapy are:

- Heat & Cold for acute pain
- Ultrasound sound-waves that warm up the muscle tissue
- Electronic stimulus for nerve ruptures and to "wake up" the nerves
- Pelvic floor stimulation for incontinence
- Acupuncture which can offer relief from the pain of degenerative conditions such as osteoarthritis

We got to see a short video of a dog utilizing the underwater treadmill and cavalettes. Caring Canine also uses holistic ap-

proaches to healing such as chinese herbs, nutrition and nutraceutical supplements and Bach flower remedies for stress and behavioural issues,

Loving Touch Animal Center and Caring Canine are sister locations—one in Stone Mountain, the other in Atlanta.

## Flea & Tick Season is Upon Us!

Did you know???

That once on an animal, an adult flea will remain on the pet for the remainder of the flea's life. What a pet owner observes on their pet is only about 5% of the entire flea infestation.

Female fleas lay up to 50 eggs a day. A female flea consumes 25 times its body weight in blood daily and deposits feces, or flea dirt on your pet.

Pets acquire fleas from an environment infested with developing immature eggs, larvae and pupae.

Flea control should be used all year even in cooler climates. Pets can acquire fleas any time they enter an infested area, such as a dog park or even where wildlife are.

Your best course of flea prevention is keeping your pet on a

flea preventative and not miss a dose!

Also, make sure you thoroughly vacuum your carpets, weekly wash your pet bedding and vacuuming of where you pet lay.

Remember, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure!



## AKC Offers Grand Champion Titles at Conformation Events



The American Kennel Club® is pleased to announce that it will begin offering the Grand Champion title at AKC Conformation events. This new title will be available to AKC Champions of Record, giving the opportunity for Champion dog owners to return to the show ring with their dogs and further showcase the quality of their breeding stock. Competition for this new title will begin at AKC all-breed, group and specialty shows on May 12, 2010, concurrent with the implementation of the 2010-2011 [AKC Point Schedule](#).

"AKC Conformation is meant to be an evaluation and showcase for breeding stock. Many Champions are retired after earning their titles and this creates a dilemma for breeders. We are excited to offer the Grand Champion title as a way to encourage these quality dogs to return to the ring," said Robin Stansell, AKC Vice President of Event Operations. "AKC Companion and Performance events offer multiple titles to celebrate achievement in competition at various levels in the sport. It is only natural to offer a Grand Champion title to Conformation exhibitors so that they too can compete and excel with their dogs at a whole new level."

Competition for this new title will be judged during the Best of Breed/Variety competition at all-breed, group and specialty shows. All Champions of Record entered in the Best of Breed/Variety competition will be eligible to compete for Grand Championship points. There is no additional entry fee. Grand Championship points are

awarded, at the judge's discretion, to the following placements: Best of Breed/Variety, Best of Opposite Sex, Select Dog and Select Bitch. Select Dog and Select Bitch are Champions that were recognized as the top quality of their sex after BOB and BOS have been awarded.

Grand Championship points are calculated using the same AKC Point Schedule as is used for Championship points. (Dogs entered in non-regular classes are not counted in the computation of Championship or Grand Championship points.) Champions of Record including champions that are non-regular class winners (i.e. Veterans Class Winners) or dogs that have been "moved up" to Best of Breed competition for the show are the only dogs eligible for Grand Championship points. Although Winners Dog or Winners Bitch can win Best of Breed or Best of Opposite Sex, in no case will they be eligible for Grand Champion competition.

### Grand Championship points may be awarded to eligible dogs as follows:

- Best of Breed – All dogs of both sexes in the breed or variety exhibited in the regular classes and Best of Breed competition will be counted
- Best of Opposite Sex to Best of Breed – All dogs of the same sex in the breed or variety exhibited in the regular classes and

Best of Breed competition will be counted  
 Select Dog or Select Bitch – The total number of dogs of the same sex in the breed/variety defeated in the regular classes and BOB competition will be counted. (i.e. 2 dogs less than the total number of the same sex)

### Completion of the title requires all of the following:

- Twenty five Grand Championship points
- Three "majors" (three or more points earned at a single show) won under three different judges
- At least one or more of these points won under a fourth judge
- Must have defeated at least one other AKC Champion of Record at three shows

*Starting in 2010, dogs who earn their Grand Champion title will receive an invitation to the AKC/Eukanuba National Championship.*
